

Question: Explain how top-level Web domain names are proposed and approved

Answer: Top-level web domain names, such as .com, .org, and .net, are proposed and approved by the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers which is also called ICANN. Organizations or individuals interested in creating a new Top-level web domain must submit a detailed application to ICANN, outlining the intended purpose of the Top-level web domain, and explain the process on how they are planning to use it. ICANN carefully reviews each application to ensure there are no conflicts with existing Top-level web domain or intellectual property issues. Once the proposal passes evaluation and requirement, the new Top-level web domain is added to the Domain Name System on the host server like namecheap or Go Daddy and many more allowing it to be used by websites.
